We have a Sewing Team that makes a significant and visible contribution by sewing all SMSD dog vests. Gayle Thomasson was the first volunteer to sew the vests, and last year Gayle passed the torch to Rose Remund, our current Sewing Team Leader. We are fortunate to have Rose, as she is an award winning quilter and also volunteers for Quilts of Valor. The sewing team is assisted by the Tellico Village Quilters Embroidery Group. Rose and her team, Joyce Bartolone and Nancy Hutchins, sew the green vests in all sizes; small for puppies, medium and large for kennel, and advanced foster dogs. In addition, they sew the VERY special red vests with unique patches for dogs that have been placed with their recipient. Brian Liebenow, Retired Air Force Maj, SMSD Volunteer Advance Foster, and Man on the move!

Brian and Betsy Liebenow are preparing for a trip to Bern, Switzerland as Brian competes in the Paraclimbing World Championships representing the United States as one of only 5 or 6 athletes in the RP1 (Range and Power) division. Brian only began climbing 2 years ago after he was inspired by watching his daughter Grace, age 16, participate in the sport at Bearden High School. He trains three to four days a week at one of two gyms in Knoxville and also does finger exercises at home to develop grip strength.

Brian qualified to represent the USA by competing in the National Championships in Austin, Texas, in March of this year. His placement in the RP1 category pits him against more able-bodied competitors but he's ready to take them on in spite of his multiple challenges brought about by his deployment to an old Soviet airbase in Uzbekistan where they used to dump chemical weapons, as a result of which, in Brian's words, "I now live with an amputated arm, clavicle, and three ribs, gastroparesis, and I eat through a feeding tube."

This is truly a family affair as Betsy is his chief cheerleader, although it's tough for her to watch him up so high. She is his travel companion and makes sure he is eating well while on the road, not easy with a feeding tube. Grace, who is belay certified, belays him whenever he trains in Knoxville.

Brian is grateful to Catalyst Sports which has supported him along the way. They offer adaptive climbing, kayaking and biking activities for all ages and also have a veterans climbing initiative. 2023 SMSD GOLF CHALLENGE

The Smoky Mountain Service Dogs Golf Challenge of 2023 took place on 24 June at the Tellico Village Toqua Golf Course. The event was another success for SMSD and raised almost \$35,000. This amount covers all the costs of acquiring, raising, and training a mobility assistance service dog -over a two-year period! – for a disabled Veteran.

The Golf Committee (consisting of 9 volunteers) organized the event, supported by 60+ volunteers to help execute the event. The Golf Challenge is probably one of the most unconventional golf tournaments played on any of the Tellico Village courses. Barry Corle is responsible for designing the 'challenges' on the course, which include sitting on a toilet while teeing from hole #13 and then chipping into kiddie pools filled with water on hole #18. More than 95% of each donation SMSD receives is directed to making a difference in a Veteran's life and at no cost to the Veteran. Canine Ambassador Hooligan was named by the parents of Spc. John Hargreaves, Paul and MaryLynn Hargreaves. Suzy Kitchens happened to meet MaryLynn as they were both waiting in a local bank lobby. During their conversation, Suzy shared her work with SMSD and MaryLynn shared that her son John had recently lost his life while enlisted in the Army. Out of that meeting, the Hargreaves decided one way they would honor their son's memory and service would be to sponsor a Smoky Mountain Service Dog. When they were given the opportunity to name a dog, they chose to name it after their son's platoon. The Hargreaves became loyal supporters of SMSD and even invited SMSD Hooligan to meet many members of the Hooligan Platoon as they hosted an annual gathering at their home. They were a wonderful couple and we miss them greatly.



Billy and **Boomer**

In June of 2013, Air Force Veteran Billy Marshall graduated with his first service dog "Lucy." Lucy was Billy's "battle buddy" for seven years until this wonderful canine crossed the Rainbow Bridge due to cancer. Two years prior, SMSD reached out to all of our Veteran Recipients and asked if they would like to suggest names for an incoming puppy. Lots of wonderful names were submitted including Billy's suggestion of "Boomer." Soon puppy Boomer was in training as a future mobility assistance service dog. Amazing that an Air Force Explosive Ordinance Disposal Specialist, who sacrificed an arm and a leg for his nation, would name a puppy Boomer. Two years later, as Lucy was retired due to illness, the Marshall family was ready to take on a second service dog into the family. After the SMSD Team reviewed our inventory of canines and which might be the best choice for Billy, it was determined that Boomer, the puppy he had named two years earlier, would be the match. Billy and Boomer are now in their third year together and are a great team. Lucy will always be remembered by all as a most incredible, canine but it is heartwarming to see Boomer and Billy doing so well.

Hooligan Platoon Members MaryLynn Hargreaves

Kola was named by our friend Mary Brown. The word "Kola" comes from the Lakota Native American Sioux tribe. The term "friend" does not describe the true meaning of the Lakota concept of Kola. A Kola was much more than a friend. It was a term that meant your Kola was closer to you than your brother. If the opportunity ever arose, you would literally lay down your life for your Kola. The World War II story of Buddy Red Bird and Red Thunder illustrates this concept. Buddy and Red Bird met while in boot camp during World War II and fought in five major battles. To understand how significant five battles were, the men of the 101st Airborne Division opon which the book and series *Band of Brothers* is based were in three battles.

Before each battle Red Thunder would say to Buddy Red Bird, "Kola, if anything happens to me I want you to marry my wife and raise my son." Buddy would always tell Red that he would be all right and that they would both make it home together. Well, Red Thunder did not make it home, having lost his life in the last battle they were in. Being the true Lakota and living up to the true concept of the Kola, when he returned home and was discharged, he went to Montana, married Red Thunder's wife and raised his son.
